#### INTRODUCTION

LCUUF came together in 2006 in response to a local webboard posting by a long-time UU and resident of the Lake Chapala area, asking if there was interest in forming a local fellowship. Four UU's met to form a fellowship and twelve people attended our first service. Today we have over 100 members and friends and are a healthy, thriving and growing fellowship. # **Board Activities 2023-2024**

LCUUF was founded 17 years ago, though by our denominational standards we are still a young startup. In reality, based on our financial stability and growing membership, we are beginning to

transition to what could be defined as an established mid-sized congregation. What does this mean? It means that with more members, there is more programming, more activities and more opportunities to engage and become involved. It also means that the informal organizational structures and practices that we have sustained ourselves with are no longer sufficient to effectively and/or efficiently serve our needs. The board has recognized this and has put quite a bit of work into formalizing the informal. Here are some of the more important projects your board has worked on this year.

Policies: It is human nature or at least UU nature to push boundaries which is good up to a point, the point where the good of the whole congregation is compromised. This year the board has defined and put in place a number of new policies and/or operational guidelines) to more clearly define how we manage events, fundraise, receive donations and gifts and use of the building.

Financial: We have been financially sound for as long as I have been a member and that is a good thing. Our annual budget grows as we grow, both in value and complexity. For example this year's budget includes rental expenses for the first time. Also we have hired Jesus and Fernanda, our first "local hires" which comes with specific accounting requirements base on Mexican Law. We were very fortunate to have Al Castleman agree to serve as treasure. Al comes to us with robust financial experience and has been working to formalize our budging and account practices to bring us more in line with what I believe Al would call auditable financial record keeping. Thank you Al.

Charitable Giving: This year the board approved a comprehensive plan and structure for how we select the charities we support through "Share The Basket" and other "giving" opportunities. The hard work for this was done by the new Social Action Team spearheaded by D'vorah Kelley and Colleen Beery. Their team did a tremendous amount of work defining a "vetting" structure for selecting charities based on a defined set of criteria. In addition the members of the SAT Team visited

and interviewed each of the charities they determined we should support. As a result of their work we have added two new organizations to our Share The Basket list of charities. We have been able to add these new organizations because the congregation has been so generous with "Share the Basket" donations.

Tech Support: The board has worked closely with the tech team this year monitoring the challenges of supporting the quality of Sunday Service we deliver in-house and online. There is no doubt that we present a very professional service from a technological perspective, especially for our Zoom attendees (and we have been recognized nationally for it.) I have personally attended three UU Congregations since becoming a member of our tech team. Not one of them even comes close to what we produce. Most provide a single camera angle and little to no use of slides or visual projections—basically where we were before the pandemic. Under Matt and Charlie's direction we have evolved from a camera on a tripod to where we now work with 3 moveable cameras, a fixed camera for large screen monitors, including the teleprompting monitor. The board has recognized our growing tech requirements and has supported the tech teams requests for an additional camera and critical software to automat how sound, videos, slides and camera angles all coordinate. After 3 threes years of relying on 4-5 volunteers every Saturday and Sunday (for which many of us had become quite burned out) The board developed a tech assistant job description and with the invaluable help of Heidi MacLannan and Paula Odom, identified Fernanda and Jesus who have now been with us for six months and, through their contributions, we now need no more than 2 people on Sundays to make things happen. It has been a big move for the board to take on "local" employees and we are now looking to formalize "personnel" policies and processes. (If any of you have personnel backgrounds and experience we would welcome your help.)

Communications: At the beginning of 2023 it was becoming obvious that the level of activities and events of our growing congregation would require a more frequent and timely way to communicate to our members and friends. The board agreed and authorized the creation of a weekly newsletter, replacing the wonderful monthly newsletter that had been published by Kathy Koches for a number of years. Having years of experience publishing in-house newsletters I agreed to create a weekly newsletter. In April of this year we launched the LCUUF News Of The Week (NOW) which has been well received. A side benefit of the weekly news digital format is that we can track readership and have been able to clean up our mailing list to accurately reflect the correct audience of members and friends.

Rev. Matt took the lead to migrate our information management platform from groups IO to Google Workspace and with Colleen Beery's help we have successfully

migrated our documents and records to a much more useable and accessible platform, although many of us in leadership are working through the learning curve.

Roy Haynes continues to support our services with his beautifully designed PowerPoint Slides and reinforces our weekly newsletter with the announcement slides presented every Sunday. Thank you Roy for your valuable and professional contribution to our Sunday Services and all of your beautiful seasonal aesthetics that make our space beautiful.

The Move: I can still remember that Monday morning when I got the call (I Think from Lorna Dean) that the owner of this building no longer wished to lease it to us. Within a week the board met in special session and approved a search committee (Lorna, Larry, Paula and Joan) and within a week they had already researched 40 locations and within 2 weeks had selected St. Andrews Episcopal. With a location decided the board Asked Paula Odom to serve as the project manager for our move. Words cannot describe what an amazing job she has done and I have no doubt that next week will be a historic one as we move to our new location. The board has only had to engage for approvals on things like new service start time and some misc. move expenses. Individual board member have take a more active role...Paula of course has the full time job of project manager. Challe and Matt have been working with SA to integrate our system with theirs. I have participated in a number of "integration" meetings where we engaged in a give and take between SA, LCUUF and BareStage and to date all has gone well. Matt has also worked with BareStage on the design of their stage in a way that will allow us to leave our production studio permanently set up saving time and wear and tear on our equipment. Cat has been working on coordinating calendars (a real challenge) with 3 organizations using the same space and on the same day at least once a month. And finally, Al has been working with our budget to accommodate new expenses and has been working with their financial folk to define additional shared expenses and payment options.

#### **Summary**

I am pleased to report that the state of the congregation is strong, we are a growing, fiscally sound and loving community, one of the best I have ever been associated with. I am looking forward to what 2024 has to bring.

#### **Rev Matt Alspaugh**

As Kriss provided much detail in the Board Activities section, I will keep my report brief.

This has been a good year, another good year, for us at LCUUF. We are stronger than ever, our Sunday Services are consistently of high quality, people care for each other, especially when people are sick or injured, we've been reaching out to help the local community more generously, our leadership and congregational culture are strong.

The big news this year is the move. I was initially disappointed to hear about our need to relocate, as I thought it would distract from other goals we had. I became even more unsure when both our two top relocation choices involved sharing space with others, either with a bar with trivia and karaoke, or a traditional Christian church with a choir loft and an organ. We chose the Anglican church.

I have warmed to the move, as I have gotten to know our contacts at St. Andrews Anglican, particularly the ministers, and I really feel that we can work together well. Not just as in, 'how do we stay out of each other's way', but 'how can we work together to achieve some shared goals'. For example, I know we and St. Andrews have shared interests in social action work, particularly supporting the local community, and I'm excited that we might be able to work together on these areas. Also, the Anglicans are quite interested in our tech work, and we're already working to share tech resources. Personally, I'm glad to have other ministers to converse with, and I think our lay leaders also may enjoy collaborating with the Anglican lay leadership. To be clear, a collaborative relationship like this does not change who we are, but such a relationship can help us have a deeper understanding of who we are and what we do. Similarly, we continue to share space with Bare Stage, as they are moving to St. Andrews also. This promises to be a smoother relationship as some of the issues we've had will not follow us to the new space.

I have been involved with several UU congregations, either as their minister, or before that as a lay leader. I have interacted with many more in denominational roles, offering training, helping congregations find

ministers, and in district and regional leadership. When I reflect back on those other congregations, and then consider this congregation, LCUUF is, well, like a pleasant dream. The culture is solid here, the congregation is healthy. I enjoy working with you, and our working together has been satisfying and fruitful. There is a love here, a love for each other, and for the congregation. This love is perhaps more intense than in other places because most of us chose to move to Lakeside, we chose this congregation, and these have become 'our people,' as we live our lives in a different culture. It is this love, this deep connection with one another, that I notice, and cherish; it gladdens my heart.



# **Sunday Service Committee 2023 End of Year Review**

The Sunday Service Committee (SSC) is responsible for planning and organizing high quality, diverse Sunday services which reflect Unitarian Universalist principles and

sources of faith. We met each month to review the previous month's services and plan or fine tune upcoming services. The feedback we've received has been very positive in terms of both presenters and topics.

We were very pleased to welcome three new members in 2023: Kathy Varty, Rena Swan, and Barley Donahue.

Services on a variety of topics were presented by Rev. Matt (22), LCUUF members (20), and outside guest speakers (4). There have been two important changes in 2023. The implementation of the Quarterly meetings beginning in January has made the job of the SSC much more manageable, and is a reflection of the goal of shared ministry. At each meeting those in attendance, usually about 15 LCUUF members, volunteer to be presenters, service associates, suggest possible topics, and by the end of the meeting the next three months are 98% planned. We would like to encourage all those interested in developing quality services to attend the quarterly meetings in 2024!

The second change, which is slowly being implemented, is that we are now using Google Workspace and a shared Drive - a challenging but worthwhile endeavor. Cat and D'Vorah have done 1:1 trainings on the benefits and use of Google Workspace.

The creation of a manual for SSC was developed and completed in 2023. It contains job descriptions of the committee, committee chair, Service Associates, Associates, and other important information.

We would like to thank Matt for his leadership and vision as we move into greater shared ministry.

Looking ahead to 2024, Erica Hewitt, Minister of Worship Arts for the Unitarian Universalist Association, has a 12 modules series on Worship design which we plan to offer in March for anyone interested.



#### **Social Action Team**

Reflecting over the past 18 months In July of 2022, our Board President, Kriss Gang and his wife Deb Gang, presented a wonderful Sunday

service about UU Resistance and Social Justice, asking our fellowship to consider taking action to support social justice causes in the Lake Chapala region. This service spurred a number of members, including me and D'Vorah Kelley, to answer the call to action. We met with Kriss and Matt a few weeks later, formed a team, created a vision statement, and started making plans for how to support social justice education, events, and community outreach at LCUUF.

In the year and a half since we formed our Social Justice Team, we have accomplished a lot. We held four Sunday services during 2023 on the topics of Social Justice, covering topics such as migration and women's history. Our team organized three events: an International Women's Day celebration and two Peace/Light/Love vigils that have been very well received. We created large poster boards for all our principles, in both Spanish and English, to be used at services and events. We encouraged members to order and wear their LCUUF "Elige Amor" t-shirts at events for community visibility.

We also worked long and hard on reviewing all the community organizations that the

fellowship has been sponsoring financially over the years and recommended some new ones to the Board as well. We have set a schedule for these six organizations to come visit during selected Sunday Services so that you can learn about the great work that they are doing Lakeside, and discover ways we can support them with our time, talents, and treasures. We have an ever-growing team of dedicated members involved in supporting social action and justice, including Catherine and Eric Luria, Dee Dee Camhi, Kathy Varty, John Cleveland, Mark Etkin, and June Wilson. We are always glad to have more members on the team, so please reach out to one of us. We'd love to have you join us!
