

Michael Reason, our Music Director and Artistic Director of the Lake Chapala Orchestra, will present an exploration of how music is not just a universal language that influences all of us, but is also a universal power that has healing potential both physically and emotionally.

Dave Ellison was a true-believer, accepting without question both Catholic and United States dogmas. His life experiences, however, as both a teacher and a traveler, led him to discard any and all prescribed notions, and to embrace stoic existentialism. Indeed, he finally recognized that beliefs matter far less than values—moral principles and goals—which guide his daily life. In this talk, Dave will briefly review his philosophical journey, and then focus on these values, and why he chose them; culminating with his current credo which embodies them.

During his thirty-six-year career, David Ellison was a teacher, mentor teacher, school administrator, education columnist and community activist. He worked in schools foreign and domestic, public and private, grades four through college. His treks through five continents included volunteering in far-flung villages, and surviving harrowing adventures.

Most of you know I was away from Lakeside part of October and November, traveling to Italy to see family and to Croatia as part of a delightful group tour with Road Scholar. One surprise for me was that practically everyone I encountered in Croatia spoke at least some English, and most spoke it very well. I learned that Croatians must take English starting in primary school, and so it is a strong second language for them.

This of course made interacting with most people quite stress-free. I didn't have to pantomime what I needed, or resort to trying to get Google Translate to

understand both of us. Also, many advertising signs were only in English, as both local people and most European tourists could read these to some extent. I was glad for this, as the Croatian language has little parallel with English and is considered a fairly difficult language for English-speakers to learn. Even the niceties like greetings are unfamiliar —I only learned živjeli (cheers!). Fortunately, like Spanish, Croatian words are generally pronounced as written, even for words like 'čvrsk' (strong) or 'prst' (finger).

I realize that here in Mexico, and certainly at Lakeside, many Mexican citizens have learned English as a second language. Most are proud of this skill, as they know it opens doors for employment and travel outside Latin America. I too am trying to learn some Spanish. I'm slow and timid about it, and used to get annoyed, well, more precisely embarrassed, when Mexicans would switch our conversation to English just to get the job done. I accept that it's far more valuable for them to learn English than for me to learn Spanish, so I'm happy to let them learn on my time. I still study my Spanish, as it is useful in more rural areas and in other parts of Latin America. More importantly, it keeps me learning and helps connect me with the people, the history and the culture here.

Travel brings insights, along with enjoyment. I've enjoyed this travel, but I'm glad to be back. And I'm glad to see things going so well in my absence. Thanks to all of you who made that so.

Climate Justice and LCUUF (progress report)

Eighteen persons—mostly active members of LCUUF, a few recent visitors and a couple of guests met this past Monday evening (11/11) in the sanctuary of St. Andrews to take further steps to address climate justice at Lakeside. This group

resulted from presentations at the Fellowship over the past month and a half on ecological concerns. The first of these presentations, What is Climate Justice by Bob Koches (Sep. 29), was the springboard, which was followed on Sunday, October 13 with a service led by D'vorah Kelley, Dee Dee Camhi and Catherine Luria on Climate Justice Revival: Putting Love at the Center, and a workshop on the topic that afternoon.

Subsequently, at an afternoon meeting on Oct. 24, several of us took ideas from the revival/workshop to begin planning actions that we could take to assist our local Mexican residents with ecological projects they are already engaged with. At the Nov. 11 meeting the group heard a report on a local initiative named Siempre Verde ("Forever Green") and agreed to bring financial and other support to this project, which presently is engaged in planting indigenous trees around the Lake. Another report focused on the work

of a young Ajijic Mexican lawyer who is personally engaged in bringing awareness of Lake Chapala's toxicity levels and related ecological concerns directly to the federal government in Mexico City. Though not as fully embraced by the group as the hands-on work of Siempre Verde, there arose sufficient interest by some to help finance the lawyer's travel to the capital. Opportunities to contribute to one or both of these local initiatives will be forthcoming. The meeting was characterized by spirited sharing around ways that various members are personally engaged with ecological concerns (such as reduction in the use of plastics, recycling, using biodegradable dish and laundry soaps or earth friendly sheets, opting for a vegan diet, and so forth).

The LCUUF Climate Justice Team plans on meeting every other month with the next meeting scheduled for January. 13, 2025. A smaller working group, meeting on in-between months, was charged with creating fund-raising opportunities at LCUUF to support Siempre Verde. Stay tuned fellow earth lovers for opportunities to be engaged with helping to bring climate justice with love to Lakeside.




