

"We Are The Gratitude People"

Ralph Waldo Emerson considered art as a way for the artist to express their inner self, their "spirit," and to share a deeper understanding of the world with others. The LCUUF Board met for its April meeting on Monday the 21st. All board members were present. Here are some of the topics discussed:

New accounting system: Ted Fahy, bookkeeper and VP, working in collaboration with treasurer Larry Pihl, has nearly completed the conversion of the LCUUF accounting system to Quickbooks, a

laborious task that will now give the treasurer a greater and easier ability to track and report the Fellowship finances. In addition to moving to Quickbooks, Ted and Larry have been updating and improving how Fellowship revenues and expenses are tracked and reported to more accurately reflect our overall financial situation. Ted has also created a comprehensive "LCUUF Structural and Financial Primer"- treasurer's manual- a 37-page documentation of all Fellowship financial processes and procedures. This document will be an invaluable aid to future LCUUF treasurers. Many thanks to the countless hours spent on these important and overdue tasks.

Congregational Mission and Vision planning: The board continued its discussion about how to plan and implement a Mission and Vision workshop for the Fellowship. LCUUF currently does not have a mission or vision statement. The importance of having a Mission and Vision is to provide the congregation with a sense of purpose and direction and to provide the leadership with guidance for program planning, social action priorities and Fellowship budgeting. Matt and Kriss are currently looking into potential "professional" facilitators to guide us through this important process. The board is also looking at attendance records to determine the most optimal time to initiate this process.

Social Action: The Social Action Team and Matt will be reviewing a proposal for two sessions on 1) History of US/Mexico and then 2) Culture in Mexico and relationships between Mexico and the ex-pat community. These would be either 3-4 one-hour sessions or two two-hour sessions. The workshops would be bracketed by Sunday services covering the workshop topics. The timing of these workshops and presentations is still being discussed.

Music Director: With the pending departure of Michael Reason as LCUUF Music Director (to focus 100% of his time on the Lake Chapala Orchestra), the Sunday Service Team will take on the task of determining the current and future direction of the LCUUF music program. This will be a featured topic at their upcoming day-long retreat on April 30th. Stay tuned for upcoming information about how the music program will be moving forward.

The LCUUF Board meets on the third Monday of each month at 1:30 at St Andrews. All board meetings are open to members and friends. (Note: Our May meeting on Monday the 19th will be held at June Wilson's home due to heat conditions in May at St. Andrews.) 




