Why Quarterly Planning Meetings by D'vorah Kelley

The Quarterly Planning Meetings is how we get things done and we need your help! When I joined the Sunday Service Committee, now the Sunday Service Team, we were "expected" to take responsibility for two months' worth of services – find the speakers to fill in around Matt's two services – so usually we were responsible for four services

– in the recent past, before I joined, members were responsible for three months!

Lucky for us, Matt conceived of a different model -one that would involve more of the congregation in shaping the services. Beginning in January 2023 we began to hold a meeting after the service once a quarter, inviting members and friends to participate in planning the outline of the upcoming month's services – usually the speaker, service associate, and topic. To our amazement, and joy, we very easily filled three months' worth of services! And perhaps as a result, our SST has grown – we now have nine members and two "adjunct" members - Matt and Cate Howell.

FAQ

Q: "If I come to a QPM, does that mean I have to give a service?"

A: Not at all! (But you would be helped all along the way if you decided to!)

Q: "I'm new to LCUUF. Would this be a good way to get involved?"

A: Absolutely! It would give you an idea of how we operate, what topics are of interest, and you might even be willing to try a small part in a service.

Q: "What would a small part be?"

A: We always need readers, people to look up information for the presenter, people to light the chalice, pass the mike.

Q: "What is a Service Associate?"

A: Our Service Associates (SA) play a very important role – they are the front-line folks who are responsible for reading the opening words, the chalice lighting words, the Share the Basket, etc. Their role can range from just showing up to read the teleprompter, to finding readings, and/or brainstorming with the presenter. We ask that any first-time presenters serve as a SA first to become acquainted with our process.

Q: "When is the next Quarterly Meeting?"

A: May 11th after the service for about an hour. We will plan for June/July/August.




Remembering AI Castleman


